To our Habitat Family,

While Habitat South Sarasota continues to deepen its roots by providing affordable homes for deserving families, it also embraces change. Over the years, new construction concepts, economic conditions, and the increase in families in need, have required our affiliate to “stretch and grow and reach new heights.”

Garden Park, our first multi-family neighborhood, is well on its way to completion. Construction of our first WOMEN BUILD project, one of the villas in Garden Park, has reached the half-way mark. The amazing women who are building this villa have broken a “glass ceiling” that we didn’t realize existed. Now, more women have the skills to comfortably take their place beside men on a Habitat construction site.

Our work with the Neighborhood Stabilization Program will continue. This federally-funded project focuses on rehabilitating foreclosure houses in the North Port area. To date, Habitat South has rehabbed 19 houses for purchase by partner families.



Looking ahead, the construction of a duplex in Englewood, an area where we would like to become more active and visible, will begin in early 2012. Conceptual plans are underway for a new mini-subdivision of 6 to 8 homes located near the Laurel Civic Association, within walking distance of the Legacy Trail. Our hope is to improve the community of Laurel by making sanitary sewer available. Construction is expected to begin in late 2012.

With God’s blessings and your continued assistance, Habitat South can look forward to deepening its roots and nurturing these new branches in the coming year.

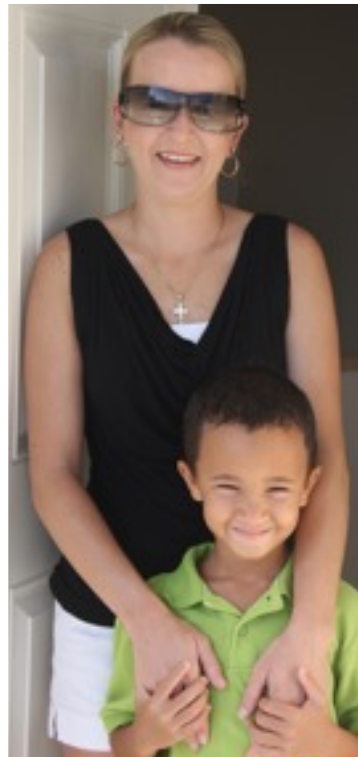

Since 1992, Habitat has provided homes for purchase to 77 families and 157 children in Venice, Nokomis, Laurel, Engelwood, and North Port. Children have been born, grown up, gone to the same school year after year, graduated from high school and college while benefitting from the security of stable housing. Since 2003, Suzette and Duane Mesquita of North Port have raised ten children in their Habitat home: Delano, 28; Anthony, 23; Sheresa, 22 (all college graduates); Aiesha, 20; Samantha, 18, Deneisha, 15; Duane, Jr., 13; Andrew, 11; Daniel, 10; and Sammy, 6. Delano, Anthony, and Aiesha now have homes of their own. Suzette says their house symbolizes for them God's blessing on their family and allows them to enjoy a piece of the American Dream. Duane takes pride in his belief that all things are possible and that they have provided a stable home for their children. When Suzette became pregnant with their first child, Duane's dream was to build Suzette a house with a white picket fence. The fence will come later, but as Suzette says, "He got me my house. Dreams do come true."



Nancy Sharp, with her son Jesse, left, and her husband Larry, moved into her Habitat home in South Venice in 2001. When a family has been approved by the Board of Directors, it is assigned a mentor by the Family Support Committee. The mentor answers questions, encourages the family, and helps family members as they perform their sweat-equity hours, save for their home deposit, and complete their classes.

Addie Griffith, mentor to Stephanie Gillespie, enjoys working with Stephanie, whom Addie says "has a good head on her shoulders." Addie and Stephanie have also developed a mutual bond. Stephanie appreciates both Addie's guidance and her friendship. "I know I can count on her when and if I need help."

Applying for a Habitat home is a detailed process. It is NOT a short-term solution to housing problems. If accepted into the Habitat program, it usually takes from nine months to a year for a partner family to complete the requirements for a Habitat home.

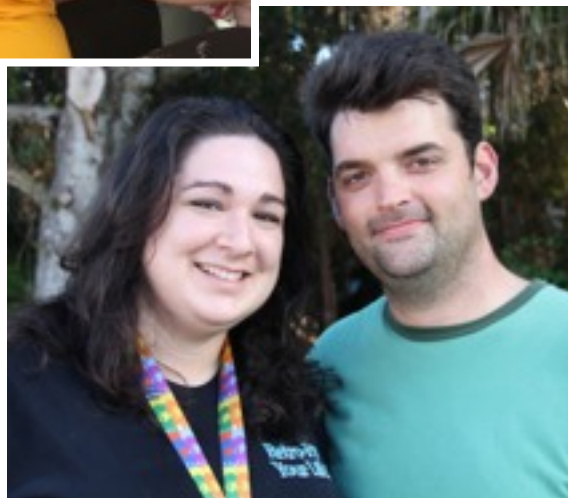
The Family Selection Committee determines if the applicant family meets the Habitat guidelines which fall into three main categories: need for low-cost housing, willingness to partner with Habitat, and the ability to repay their mortgage. From there, the process becomes more detailed, covering specific aspects of the family's history. If all the criteria is met, the family is presented to the Board of Directors for approval. Donna Wolfson of the Selection Committee believes that it takes many hands to build a house, but that it takes a heart to make a home. She says sharing in a family's Habitat journey is a fabulous thing to do.



The Family Support Committee begins its work once the Board approves a partner family. Classes on home buying, home ownership and money management are "musts" for the adults. This education component provides an understanding of the complexities and challenges of being a homeowner and balancing a budget. According to Pat Coelho, an eight-year Habitat education instructor (pictured above on far right), these classes help the families gain the tools they will need once they have their own homes. Pat says that getting to know each partner family on a personal level makes each dedication ceremony an emotional experience.

Although the financial benefits are many, the greatest benefit for a Habitat family has nothing to do with money. Families, often for the first time, have a safe, permanent home. For families with children, the children witness the benefits of hard work and determination in achieving a cherished goal. For the homeowners, the sense of pride and accomplishment is beyond measure.

Whether a Habitat partner family consists of a single parent with children, a couple with children, or a couple without children, each family must complete 300 sweat-equity hours working on his or her home, the home of another Habitat family, and/or volunteering in some other Habitat capacity.

## Mr. "Can Man" Retires

When you hear the name, Mr. Can Man, you know people are talking about John Milton. In 2003, John undertook the leadership of Habitat's Aluminum Can Recycling Program, building it into a financial success as well as a tool for helping partner families earn their sweat equity hours.

"We began with ten Can Cottages when Habitat International initiated the program," he says. "In the early days a pound of aluminum (about 32 cans) brought in 20 cents. Now we have 25 cottages and the price at the moment is 50 cents a pound. It's been as high as 60 cents, but the economy has changed things." In addition to the cottages, there are 50 cardboard recycling boxes inside various businesses and organizations in the Habitat South area. The average annual total of aluminum cans collected is 8-9,000 pounds, which nets Habitat about \$4,000 a year.

According to John, there are two significant factors in the program: first, finding sites for the outdoor-collection Can Cottages and inside-of-building locations for cardboard recycling boxes; and second, determining routes, schedules, and people to clear these sites on a regular basis. Over the years, a variety of dedicated volunteers have worked the pickup routes. Now, the focus is on partner families taking responsibility for the routes, helping to earn their equity hours.

Under John's attentive leadership, and with the assistance of dozens of volunteers, Habitat's aluminum can recycling program has flourished. John Milton has retired, but "Mr. Can Man" will remain as part of Habitat's institutional memory. Thank you, John Milton.

## ReModeled ReStore ReOpens

Their bright red shirts and ready smiles easily identify the volunteers of the ReStore. In season, approximately twenty volunteers work in shifts throughout the store, side-by-side with the ReStore staff. They can be found in the Boutique sorting clothes; in appliances and electronics testing products; in the book room positioning books on the shelves; assisting customers with furniture, lighting and building materials. The volunteers play an important role helping to keep the ReStore stocked. They also help out with projects such as painting, furniture repair, or whatever else that needs to be done.

"A big part of a volunteer's job is to assist our staff in providing excellent customer service," says Trish Labus, ReStore Manager. "Our volunteers are often the first contact customers have with the ReStore, and they make a great impression. With such a spacious store, their presence is essential, especially during our peak winter months."



On Wednesday, September 28th, Habitat hosted "Halfway Home . . . Because of You" both to mark our Women Build project's milestone and to thank the women volunteers who are constructing the two one-story villas at Garden Park. Women are doing it all: from leading the work crews to supplying refreshments to using nail guns, installing windows, and hanging wall board. New volunteers are welcome as the second half begins.





**Sharky's on the Pier** owner Mike Pachota and his son Justin partner with Habitat in the Community Contribution Tax Credit Program (CCTCP). Sharky's employees, their family and friends, along with loyal customers, volunteer at a Habitat building site. In return, the restaurant receives a 50-cents-on-the-dollar rebate on their sales tax receipts, up to \$200,000, for helping to build a home. The Pachotas then donate this rebate to Habitat.

Along with volunteers, business partners are essential to the success of Habitat's mission. Public corporations and private businesses, both large and small, side-by-side with faith-based organizations, all contribute to creating safe, affordable housing in South County. Presented on this page is a sampling of these partnerships.

Judy Lawrence, right, vice-president of **Synovus Bank**, facilitated the bank's sponsorship of Habitat South Sarasota County's grant application to Atlanta's **Federal Home Loan Bank** that resulted in our receiving a \$285,000 grant to be used for Garden Park. Once divided up, a little over \$17,000 was applied to the building of each of the homes there.

Before, during, and after construction, they make certain that all requirements are met for FP&L's Platinum Energy Star program and the Department of Energy's Builder's Challenge. As a result of these two designations, each Habitat home receives a \$5,000 rebate from the Sustainable Building Program. Not only does Habitat benefit from Cal-Plus' gift, but they receive a financial bonus as well.

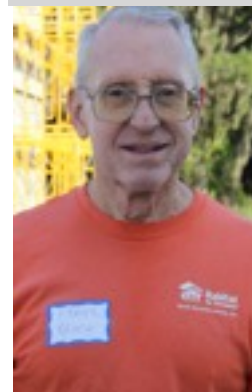
